Update - Service and Emotional Support Animal Acceptance Policy

On December 10, 2020, the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) published changes to the regulation of transporting service animals by air.

Under this new regulation, we have adjusted our policy for accepting service and emotional support animals: Effective **February 1, 2021**:

- Copa Airlines will accept the transportation of service dogs on all destinations.
- Emotional support dogs will be accepted only on routes where they are recognized in the country's regulations, i.e. to or from Brazil, Canada, Colombia and Mexico. In these cases, the transportation of the emotional support dog will be accepted on all segments of the passenger's journey.

Note: Transportation of emotional support dogs to all destinations will be accepted for passengers with tickets purchased prior to February 1, 2021, with travel dates through February 28, 2021.

		Exception: Transportation of emotional support dogs from/to Costa Rica is accepted as long as

the passenger presents a certificate stating the need for an emotional support dog due to a disability.
